

The beauty and grace of Malay culture, language and literature are now encapsulated in four new tomes released by the National Institute of Education (NIE), Singapore's Malay language experts from NIE's Asian Languages and Cultures (ALC) Academic Group on September 10, 2011 at the National Library Board. The event was launched by Mdm Halimah Jacob, Minister of State, Ministry of Community Development, Youth and Sports.

Of the four, two children's books titled, "*Burung Kenek-kenek*" (The Little Bird) and "*Bunga Kasih Ibu*" (Mom's Bouquet of Love), provide the perfect offering of Malay traditions and love told through poetry, art and song. The other two books will bring greater insight into the Malay literary world in the form of a *festschrift* compilation to honour contributions of Dr Abbas Mohammad Shariff and a first-ever refereed book on the late Singapore National Laureate, Dr Masuri bin Salikun, who is better known among literary circles by his nom de plume, as Mr Masuri

S.N. These two, are titled "*Citra Murni Insan dalam Dunia Pendidikan: Sebuah Feskrip untuk Abbas Mohammad Shariff*" (Image of the Ideal Man in Education: A Festschrift for Abbas Mohammad Shariff), and "*Masuri S.N.: Sasterawan Melayu di Persada Dunia*" (Masuri S.N.: A Malay Laureate in the International Arena), respectively. The new books were written and edited by a team of NIE academics,

together with a famed song composer Mr Zubir Abdullah and the late eminent art educator and artist, Mr S. Mohdir.

Together, the books are aimed at promoting values and vision of Malay language curriculum. Co-author and co-editor of all books, Associate Professor Hadijah Bte Rahmat, NIE Singapore's Deputy Head of the ALC Academic Group, said: "These books are important in projecting good role models, fostering an appreciation of the contributors and their talents in our society; we celebrate multiculturalism for the purpose of national education. In particular, we also saw this as an essential sharing of cultures and thus, all the four books are bilingual as well."


The PE Conference themed 'PE & Sports in 21st Century Schools' was organised in conjunction with the PESTA's launch. The

SASSE Seminar: Facilitating Discussion in Social Studies Classrooms

The newly established Singapore Association of Social Studies Education (SASSE) held its inaugural seminar on 2 August 2011. NIE academics, with the support of the Ministry of Education (MOE) curriculum officers as well as a core group of social studies teachers from primary and secondary schools, established SASSE to promote the teaching and learning of Social Studies in Singapore schools. As Social Studies is a relatively new subject in Singapore schools, one of the goals of the organisation is to encourage dialogue and discussion about the subject's aims and purposes among academics, educators, curriculum developers, and policy-makers.

For its first seminar, SASSE identified the development of active citizenship as a key focus area for its professional development activities. Professor Keith Barton, a prominent social studies educator from Indiana University, was invited to conduct a half-day seminar on facilitating discussions in social studies classrooms. The seminar was organised in collaboration with the Academy of Singapore Teachers (AST) and with the support of HSSE. The seminar was very well received and attracted about sixty participants from more than fifteen secondary schools. Professor Barton shared strategies and techniques to help teachers facilitate discussions of relevant and authentic issues in Social Studies classrooms. During the seminar, participants engaged in hands on learning by crafting questions that help facilitate different types of discussions.

Professor Lee said that Service Learning Day was an important event and that he was proud of the meaningful learning journeys carried out by GESL groups. Guest-of-Honour Miss Ek Soo Ben, Deputy Director, Standards and Research, Academy of Singapore Teachers was invited to grace the event. Miss Ek emphasized the importance of value-centeredness of teachers and a mindset of serving and learning from the community. She also shared her hope that GESL experiences will lead the student teachers forward to lead, care and inspire students in schools.



Three PGDE Secondary GESL groups represented their team mates and shared their experiences on the learning journeys at LT1. The project, "Love Across Languages" consisted of a family day event based on the theme "The Five Love Languages". The objectives of the activities were to forge closer parent-child bonding and to provide a fun and valuable experience for participants. Another group, "The Welders" carried out the project, "Joy Overdue", which was an initiative to enhance the emotional well-being of migrant workers, and at the same time promote societal acknowledgement of these workers in Singapore. Finally, in line with the NorthLight school's plan to setup a photography club, the group who initiated a project called, "NorthLight School Photo Trail" taught students basic photography skills and had the kids take photos in the Katong area along a heritage trail. The excellent photos taken by the kids were exhibited in a National Education exhibition held at their school.

After the conclusion of the event, Prof Lee, Miss Ek, Associate Deans and Sub Deans from the Office of Teacher Education toured the colourful and informative GESL project exhibition area and interacted with student teachers at all booths to understand more about their service learning journeys.



An APEC Meeting

The National Institute of Education (NIE), Singapore successfully hosted the 6th research meeting of the International Comparative Study to Identify Unique and Promising Practices in Mathematics and Science Teacher Preparation for APEC Economies. It is one of the APEC EDNET projects under the APEC Human Resources Development Working Group (for more details, visit: <http://hrd.pec.org/index.php/Projects>).

The Singapore meeting was held over 3 days from October 19 to 21, 2011. A total of 20 teacher educators from six foreign countries (Australia, China, New Zealand, Russia, Thailand, and United States) and the US Department of Education; 6 academics from NIE (including Director of NIE); and 2 subject specialists from MOE took part in the meeting.

The foreign delegates also visited River Valley High School and toured the NIE collaborative classroom, physics laboratories, and NIE Library and Information Services Centre, which is the largest education library in Singapore. Director of NIE is now a member of the Project Executive, and four sub-studies are to be completed in the coming months under the leadership of specific countries: national profiles and standards comparison (US), teacher education curriculum (China), case studies (Singapore), and assessment instruments to test the content and pedagogical knowledge of high school mathematics and science trainee teachers (US). Some of the findings are to be presented at the 5th APEC Education Ministerial meeting at Gyeongju City, Korea, May 21 to 23, 2012.



Art Paradiso

It is a little known fact that the National Institute of Education (NIE), Singapore campus has a treasure trove of exquisite art pieces that were collected over some five decades. From as early as the 1950s, NIE started acquiring art right up till 2006 and has never unveiled these in a showcase till now.

Deciding it was about time, the institute held an opening to premiere some 40 fine masterpieces as a learning art adventure. Officially launched by NIE Director, Professor Lee Sing Kong, the collection of artworks were displayed from 26 August to 16 September 2011, at NIE's The Art Gallery. With some of the displayed pieces dating back to the 1940s, the exclusive presentation drew many to the space to learn more about the famed creators and their creations.

Overseen by Associate Professor Chia Wei Khuan, Head, Visual and Performing Arts Academic Group and his team, the carefully-picked artworks is a covetable manifesto of various styles by renowned local and international artists. Some of these, included watercolour, Chinese ink, oil, chalk and even brass sculptures.

Catching any art enthusiast's eye was a signature piece by renowned Chinese painter, the late Mr Qi Baishi's ink on paper titled "Prawns" (pictured, left). From the elegant and refined brushwork, it showcases his masterful variations of ink tones on the body that allude to the aquatic environment beautifully. The sensual organic forms of sculptures by 1995 Cultural Medallion recipient, Ms Han Sai Por, also punctuated the gallery space well. For connoisseurs and amateurs alike, the exhibition eloquently articulated NIE's deep art appreciation.

Building Character

For two days, the inaugural Character and Citizenship Education Conference jointly organised by the National Institute of Education (NIE) and the Ministry of Education (MOE), aimed to provide directions for Character and Citizenship Education (CCE) for Singapore schools, and offer a plethora of ideas and perspectives of CCE in both the local and overseas contexts.

Held from November 8 to 9 2011, the conference theme titled "Active and Concerned Citizens: Building Character for Community", concentrated on the importance for stakeholders in education to synergise efforts in nurturing our children to be active contributors and concerned citizens for the community. In his Guest of Honour speech, Minister for Education, Mr Heng Swee Keat expounded on the importance of inculcating sound values and good character in youths.

The conference co-chairpersons were Associate Professor Low Ee Ling, Associate Dean, Programme and Student Development,

NIE; and Ms Kok Lee Kwang, Deputy Director, Aesthetics, Health and Moral Education Branch, MOE. Its first Keynote Address was presented by Professor Lee Wing On, Dean Education Research who presented his research findings on "Education for Future-oriented Citizenship: The Implications of Education for the 21st Century Competencies". This conference also had a panel of eloquent speakers in the fields of character development, service and experiential learning, such as Ms Cathryn Berger Kaye, Professor James Arthur, Associate Professor Angeline Khoo, Dr Michael Goh, Associate Professor Fatimah Lateef, Dr Tan Lai Yong and Ms Hannah Taylor.

NIE hosted more than 1,200 local and international participants for this conference. Over the two days, there were 3 keynote presentations, 4 plenary sessions and more than 140 concurrent breakout sessions, poster presentations and workshops held. Presenters of these activities came from schools in Singapore, around the region and beyond.

The Grattan Institute in conjunction with Asia Education Foundation, Asialink and the Victorian Department of Education organised the roundtable meeting on 27 to 28 September 2011, to learn about best practices of education in East Asia. The roundtable international panel included Professor Cheng Kai Ming (Chair Professor of Education at University of Hong Kong), Dr Zhang Minxuan (President of Shanghai Normal University), Dr Yu Hyun-Sook (Director-General of Higher Education Research, Korean Education Development Institute), Professor Yong Zhao (Presidential Chair of College of Education, University of Oregon) and Professor Tan Oon Seng. Andreas Scheicher, OECD Head of Indicators and Analysis, also participated in the discussion through video conferencing. The meeting was attended by director-generals, deputy secretaries of the various state departments, chief executives and leaders of key educational establishments in Australia.


Prof Tan Oon Seng shared on how initial teacher education at the National Institute of Education (NIE) Singapore prepares teachers to meet the challenges of the 21st century. Prime Minister Julia Gillard who joined the session on 28 September, emphasised to educational leaders the need to recognise the "Asian Century" and called for new ways of engagement between Australia and East Asia. Prior to the roundtable, Prof Tan also delivered several presentations to senior policy makers and curriculum leaders at the Victorian Education department on the importance of pedagogical innovations in the curriculum, including the use of problem-based learning.

Have you experienced memorable moments where seemingly insignificant incidents turned out to be gems of lessons that propelled your passion in teaching? Here is an insightful excerpt from "A Humbling Lesson":

'I received my first posting to a neighbourhood school in 1993. Pampered for seven years in a premier school, I dreaded my first day at this new school. "Lai-liao! Lai-liao!" came shouts from my class as I approached. I wasted no time laying down the class rules....

Once, I attempted to discipline some students I had caught smoking in the toilet, but was unable to prove it. Junyi taught me what to do. "Smell their breath, or smell their fingers, 'Cher. Sure can catch one! Smell clothes no use." I have since learnt that teachers in neighbourhood school don't just teach, they also learn, for God will inevitably use illogical creatures, called teenagers, to confound complacent or presumptuous teachers.'

January

February

A prominent visit by His Excellency Mr Porfirio Lobo Sosa, President of the Republic of Honduras and his delegation to learn about Singapore's education system with emphasis on NIE's role in teacher training to equip teachers with values, skills and knowledge to meet the 21st century global education landscape.



March

Thumbs up! Singapore's teaching profession received praise from the US Secretary of Education, Mr Arne Duncan that 'Singapore has just done a tremendous job on teacher induction, teacher development, good mentoring, good support and thinking through better evaluation systems' during the 'First International Summit' in New York City – a two-day international summit attended by education ministers, teachers and union leaders from around the world.

The Physical Education and Sports Science (PESS) Academic Group, NIE hosted Professor Paul Schempp from the University of Georgia, USA, from 7 February to 4 March 2011 as PESS's Fifth EW Barker Professor. Prof Schempp delivered a series of public lectures focused on instructional expertise in developing the youth, sports instructors and elite athletes.

May and June

The successful fourth international teaching conference 2011, 'Redesigning Pedagogy' was well-attended by some 1,500 scholars and practitioners from 24 countries, resulted in an initiative to start a new research centre 'Centre for Scaling, Translation and Commercialisation' to explore new teaching methods in NIE.



June

July

Her Royal Highness, Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn of Thailand had a fruitful visit to NIE to better understand teacher education and the professional development for pre-service teachers, and special education in Singapore.



NIE's Deputy Head, Asian Languages and Cultures Academic Group and Head, Malay Language and Culture Division, Associate Professor Hadijah Bte Rahmat received the Tun Seri Lanang Award – the most prestigious in the Malay literary scene.



August

The launch of 'Physical Education and Sports Teacher Academy (PESTA)' and Inaugural PE Conference 2011, as a resource centre for professional development of Physical Education (PE) and Sports Education teachers - NIE's Head, Physical Education and Sport Science Academic Group, Dr John Wang is part of PESTA's Advisory Council.



The official opening of the NIE's Art Collection Exhibition at the NIE Art Gallery marks the first time NIE is showcasing its collection. NIE had begun acquiring art from the 1950s till 2006; with some displayed pieces dating back to the 1940s. September

NIE's Asian Languages and Cultures Academic Group launched four new Malay Culture and Education books to provide more reading materials and nurture deeper appreciation of the Asian culture for Singapore's students and teachers. NIE's Deputy Head of the ALC Academic Group and Head of the MLC Division, Associate Professor Hadijah Bte Rahmat was Co-author and co-editor of all 4 tomes.



October

NIE successfully hosted the 6th research meeting of the International Comparative Study to Identify Unique and Promising Practices in Mathematics and Science Teacher Preparation for APEC Economies, from October 19 to 21 2011. The participants included over 20 teacher educators from six foreign countries, the US Department of Education and NIE, as well as two subject specialists from MOE.



November

NIE hosted the Inaugural 'Character and Citizenship Education Conference 2011', together with the Ministry of Education. Themed 'Active & Concerned Citizens: Building Character for Community', it provided directions for Character and Citizenship Education (CCE) for Singapore schools, and offered a plethora of ideas and perspectives of CCE in both the local and overseas contexts.

Signature Pedagogies

With more than 40 years of experience and 17 honorary doctoral degrees under his belt, Professor Lee Shulman is well-known in teacher education circles, especially for his concept of pedagogical content knowledge.

We were honoured to have this Emeritus Charles E. Ducommun Professor of Education from Stanford University address us at an NIE seminar on the "Signature Pedagogies in the Professions" on 13 September 2011.

This is a topic that has fascinated Prof Shulman in recent years. How are people prepared to be professionals? Are there "signature pedagogies" of each profession? And what can teacher education learn from their pedagogies?

While at the Carnegie Foundation, he led research into how various professions, such as medicine and law, prepare their practitioners. His real motivation, however, has been to better understand the preparation of educators.

Describing himself as a teacher educator at heart, Prof Shulman said: "I was trying to understand if we can figure out how to educate teachers better... How might that apply to educating educators?"

While the disciplines are different, he noted that good teaching across disciplines shares something in common. Every profession seeks to impart its own habits of mind, hand and heart – of knowledge, skills, and values. "A great deal of preparing to teach is the learning of habits and routine that become so regular, so internalised and so practised that you can do them without having to think about them all the time."

That said, it would seem that teacher education has yet to develop its own signature pedagogy. But because "we do something very special", he believes it is a subject that is worthy of study and further improvement. Reminding his audience of educators and teacher educators of the work we do, Prof Shulman concluded: "I'd like us to think about educating teachers not as something we have to do, but something we get to do. What a privilege!"

Literary Explorers

The Singapore-leg of the South East Asian Literary Council (MASTERA) Comparative Literature Series 2011 was jointly hosted by the Malay Division of NIE's Asian Languages and Cultures Academic Group and the Malay Language Council of Singapore on Thursday, 27 October 2011. Held at one of NIE's lecture theatres, this provided a platform for researchers, students, writers and Malay literary enthusiasts from Southeast Asia to gain an appreciation of the region's rich literary writings through comparative studies of selected works

This year's lecture was presented by Professor Ayu Sutarto from the University of Jember, Indonesia on the topic titled "Sastera Bandingan dan Sejarah Sastera" (Comparative Literature and Literary History). Prof Ayu gave an account of how the field of comparative studies of Malay and Indonesian literature has developed over the years. He observed that information technology has brought about new realities of life and has influenced the proliferation of new expressions never heard before.

Local wisdom found in classic literary work such as "yang salah kalah" (the one who does wrong loses), and "semangat kebangsaan" (nationalism) have gradually given way to market-driven terms such as "kesenangan" (fun), "neoliberalisme" (neoliberalism) and "kapitalisme global" (global capitalism).

Societies may either accept the changes that market civilisation brings or reject some of these changes particularly those that threaten their cultural or national identity. These attitudes influence the creative process of writers. Through comparative literature, he said, people living in the postmodern age can have an understanding of the positive and negative impact of global trends that exist in the midst of their everyday life.

Kuala Lumpur was Prof Ayu's first stop before arriving in Singapore for the second leg of the lecture series which concluded in Flores, Indonesia.

LSL Research Team Won Two Best Paper Awards on Mobile Assisted Language Learning

NIE's mobile learning (m-learning) research team from the Learning Sciences Lab (LSL) has won accolades in the recently concluded 10th World Conference on Mobile and Contextual Learning (mLearn'11) held in Beijing this October. The team bagged two Best Paper Awards based on its two research projects on Mobile Assisted Language Learning (MALL) led by Dr. Wong Lung Hsiang, a research scientist from LSL.

The first project, entitled "Chinese-PP" is a joint research effort between Taiwanese and Croatian scholars. It aims to develop a classroom-based mobile game for learning of Chinese characters. The award-winning paper, "Designing Content-Independent Mobile Learning Technology: Learning Fractions and Chinese Language" is a constellation of reflections on the design of the Chinese-PP platform which strove to marry both technological affordances and pedagogical principles.

The second project is a multi-party collaboration between NIE, Nan Chiau Primary School, Singapore Centre for Chinese Language and Microsoft Singapore. Entitled MyCLOUD (My Chinese Language ubiquitous learning Days), the research focuses on constructing a mobile-assisted learning environment to nurture self-directed and collaborative language learners, as well as revamping classroom pedagogies. The paper, "Leveraging Ubiquitous Technology for Seamless Language Learning: From 'Move, Idioms!' to MyCLOUD" articulated the conceptual leveling-up of a recently completed project, "Move, Idioms!", that facilitates the blending of language learning into daily life with the support of mobile technologies. Another paper on "Move, Idioms!" had also won a Best Paper Award at the IEEE International Conference on Wireless, Mobile, and Ubiquitous Technology in Education in April, 2010.



NIE Making New Inroads in the Field of International Mobile Learning Research

The recently concluded project of "Seamless Learning" conducted by the Learning Sciences Laboratory (LSL) has made further inroads in the worldwide mobile learning (m-learning) research. Professor Looi Chee Kit, the Principal Investigator of the project, has recently delivered a keynote speech at the prestigious 10th World Conference on Mobile and Contextual Learning (mLearn'11) in Beijing, China. He shared with the international m-learning experts the key findings of the project. The speech has garnered positive feedback and generated enthused interests, culminating in invitations for further sharing of research results.

First inception in 2006 by seventeen internationally distinguished scholars including Professor Looi, the notion of "seamless learning" explores the integration of learning in formal and informal contexts, individual and social spaces, and physical and digital worlds, with the mediation of mobile devices carried by every student 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

The LSL m-learning research team breaks new ground in this area by being the pioneer research team in the world that conducts a three-year school-based study based on the seamless learning framework. Over the years, several spin-off projects spearheaded

by different team members have ensued. These studies aim to investigate various niche aspects of seamless learning, such as Chinese Language m-learning (see the article above), outdoor m-learning, and the scaling up of the learning model.

With four Best (Conference) Paper Awards bagged in the last four years and more than 20 papers being published in top-tier international journals, NIE is on her way to establish its name as one of the leading institutions in global mobile learning research. Recently, the Global Chinese Society on Computers in Education has identified the research niches of different institutions and invited them to host various Special Interest Groups (SIG). NIE has been "appointed" the "hosting institution" of the inaugural "Digital Classroom, Mobile and Ubiquitous Learning" SIG, an indication that NIE has made foray into the field and gained recognition from other research institutions on the global front.

The participants consisted of overseas school principals, teacher supervisors, and senior ministry officials while local participants were commanders of military schools and uniformed groups.

The two-week executive leadership programme focused on "Leading Change & Innovation". A rich learning experience that took the participants through various activities including engaging

lectures, highly participative 'syndicate' group discussions, reflective project work, and enriching school visits.

As part of the learning journey, visits to Singapore schools provided real-time examples of education management and learned from principals as to how they strategise their approaches in leadership. The participants visited Bedok Green Primary School, Greenridge Secondary School and Northlight School. Participants showed a keen interest in learning and sharing whilst embracing their common vision of improving the schools' facilities and systems and recognising the need for organisational change.

40 Senior Educators Graduate from the Leaders in Education Programme

Enhancing Teaching Pedagogy

From 15 to 26 August 2011, two groups of school leaders and senior teachers, from a diverse range of educational organisations, visited NIE for its "Enhancing Pedagogy Skills for Teacher Trainers" (EPSTT) course.

The first group, comprising of senior educators from 23 schools across the nation, came from Sri Lanka. The second was an international group which comprised senior educators from 20 different countries. These participants, who in their roles train and supervise teachers from the early childhood level to tertiary subjects, also hold various areas of specialisations – such as English Language, Natural Sciences, Mathematics and Humanities. Although diverse in background and culture, it was apparent that they shared a common passion to learn and extrapolate their experiences here into valuable input for their colleagues to derive new applications in their classrooms at home.

The two-week programme also allowed participants to gain necessary skills to enhance their teaching practice and essential concepts and techniques for promoting and assessing creative thinking in a learning environment to be ready for the 21st century. They participated in interactive lectures and peer discussion, as well as embarked on learning journeys to Singapore schools visits. Witnessing the on-the-ground applications at these, they experienced what one participant succinctly termed as "theories in practice". The schools that hosted the participants were Rivervale Primary School, Teck Whye Primary School, CHIJ Our Lady of Good Counsel, Swiss Cottage Secondary School and Presbyterian High School.

During their stay in Singapore, the participants experienced an interesting transect of the island republic. With the advantage of a hotel accommodation in the central district and with daily commutes from the city to the west (where NIE is situated), there were plenty of opportunities to immerse themselves in the Singapore's sights, sounds and culture. Their stay also included a weekend social outing that took them from the Singapore Science Centre to the popular beachside Sentosa where they have more opportunities to network and bond.

EPSTT was a success and NIE would like to thank the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Singapore for funding the teaching programme and the participants through the Singapore Cooperation Program.

Championing Sports

NIE alumna and former NIE academic, Assistant Professor C. Kunalan, was chosen to be the subject of an inspiring teacher story in the Singapore News section of the Yahoo! Southeast Asia online edition on September 12 2011.

Tracing the former Olympian's inspiring teaching journey spanning over 5 decades, the article noted how Mr Kunalan started out in the profession in 1961 at Tiong Bahru Primary School as a form teacher to a primary three class of 40 children. It noted that throughout his teaching career in the 70s, he was heavily involved in school sports whilst he carried out his teacher duties – in fact, he even led a school team to national meets victory.

The article noted his great perseverance and passion. As a form teacher in 1967, he used to work on every math problem in each chapter the night before so he could teach these the next day. It also noted how he won a scholarship and later, obtained a Masters degree and graduated top three in his cohort despite not even having a basic degree.

Titled as "If I can do it, you can do better" the feature discussed Mr Kunalan's dedication to his students and how till this day, he still keeps in touch with about 100 of his secondary school pupils every year. His wife, Madam Elizabeth Chong Yoong Yin, also shared on her husband's popularity with his past students and how they would turn to him when they were in trouble as well.

Mr Kunalan, who retired last year, stumbled into teaching in 1961 after his poor O-Level results heavily limited his career options. But he has never regretted his career choice. Currently a senior manager at the Singapore Sports Council, the article recounted how well-known he is as a local sporting legacy who won 15 medals in the Southeast Asian Games and five in the Asian Games.


